

From Your Minister...

Tackling the Tough Issues . . .

A few weeks ago Trinn and I saw the controversial, Oscar nominated film "Brokeback Mountain." While the setting is the Wyoming Rockies during the 1960's the movie gradually transcends its parameters and speaks courageously and directly to the current cultural/religious debate about same gender relationships. Currently the topic of gay/lesbian civil rights (a state issue) and sacred blessing (a church issue) is at the very epicenter of our public discourse . . . and our private kitchen tables.

Last Sunday evening over twenty people from our congregation gathered in the Narthex to talk about same gender partnerships. I hosted this dialogue with a little trepidation knowing that we have a variety of views within our Church, and that our denomination has spoken very forthrightly on the issue. In fact last July at the General Synod meeting of the United Church of Christ a resolution was passed in support of gay marriage. As you may know, this is a non-binding statement, since every local United Church of Christ operates with complete autonomy. Nevertheless, this was a strong statement that has empowered some and embittered others. For most of us, it has prompted some critical thinking and raised many questions. In our discussion we examined the biblical references to homosexuality (which I'll gladly share with you) and wondered what Jesus might have to say about it . . . had he mentioned it!

I am very heartened to tell you that the conversation we had was so loving and caring. Most of the people in attendance were very open to same gender partnerships, though clearly others were searching and uncertain. Personally I am advocate for both gay rights and gay unions, though I'm not convinced that the word "marriage" is helpful. I believe the attempt to re-construe this ancient word has alienated many who otherwise would be supportive of same gender sacred unions. At any rate, it is a bit of a moot issue at the moment given the fact that we don't have legalized gay marriage (and I don't suspect we will anytime soon). Incidentally, the proposal banning gay marriage that may come before Wisconsin this fall has significant negative implications for heterosexual non-married unions as well.

Tragically, some UCC congregations have become split over this issue. Fortunately, we have had no significant backlash here at Pilgrim. My firm conviction is that Christians can respectfully disagree, and that we need to take great care not to allow any single issue to become so dominating, indeed so disproportionately focused upon, that it undermines our greater calling to live centered in the love of Christ.

I hope this will be the first of many conversations we're calling "Tackling the Tough Issues." My thought is that we might offer a fall, winter and spring opportunity for dialogue. Other possible subjects might include: Evolution and Intelligent Design, Abortion, War and the Just War Theory, Euthanasia, the Death Penalty, etc. As always I welcome your feedback and your ideas.

Access to clean water is the theme of One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) this year. Since 1949, American churches of many denominations have joined together in support of OGHS. By doing so, we say “yes” to clean drinking water, food, and other life-sustaining necessities for those who lack the means to obtain them independently.

At Pilgrim Church, we will kick off our OGHS campaign on Sunday, March 12th, and will continue to collect through Easter Sunday. The official OGHS Sunday is March 26. Last year, we easily exceeded our goal of \$3000 and 200 participants. This year we are hoping to raise \$3500 from 225 participants. 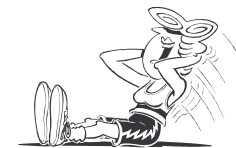

The best vitamin for a Christian is B-1.

One of the important indicators of a “healthy” Church is the financial support, pledged by its members, to underwrite the expenses of the Church. It would be nice, in an ideal situation, if the pledged income met, or exceeded, all of the Annual Budget and all pledged income was actually received. However, as we all know, we don’t live in an ideal world. Not all members make a pledge, members come and members go and many factors change that can, and does, impact how our members/families are able to financially support their Church. The statistics for Pilgrim Church are as follows and you can make your own judgment as to how “healthy” you think we are.

In 2005, 63.0% of our members/families made a pledge. In 2006, this number is 63.6%. In a way, that may be “OK”, provided that the other members make contributions. We are fortunate that, for Pilgrim, this is so in many cases. As a general rule, it is good if 90-95% of all pledged income is actually received. For 2005, our number was 89.0%. According to the reports from our computer software, the amount pledged for 2005 was \$188,448 of which \$167,624 was received. However, almost \$7,000 of this amount was from members who actually contributed more than what they had pledged. This reduced the difference to \$20,824.

In 2005, we received \$182,932 in contributions for the “Stewardship” (Adult Envelopes) Fund. The non-pledged income support, from members who were given envelopes, was \$15,308, which helped us get closer to the budgeted amount. We received “loose cash” in the amount of \$5,452 and miscellaneous income (for bulletins, from dividends, reimbursement for the cost of the envelopes, for rebates and other reimbursements and from our Church School) of \$4,331. This, together with the reimbursement for the use of our facility of \$9,989 meant that our total income was \$202,705. This put us at \$17,295 less than the proposed budget.

Looking at the financial data, 2005 appears to have been a somewhat difficult year for many members. Let us hope and pray that 2006 will be much better one for everyone, financially speaking, especially as the Capital Campaign comes to an end and we move to face the much bigger increase, for 2007, to handle the new mortgage. Remember, only \$214,461 of the \$240,000 Budget for 2006 has been pledged. If we, again, only receive 89%, will you still believe we are a financially “healthy” Church?

Interfaith Caregivers of Ozaukee County 2005 At a Glance

During the year 2005, Interfaith Caregivers volunteers contributed 4,672 hours and logged 35,686 miles performing various tasks for receivers including:

- . transportation
- . help with shopping and running errands
- . housekeeping
- . yard work
- . visiting to alleviate loneliness
- . help with paperwork and bill-paying



Volunteer service hours and miles divided by areas served:

Cedarburg/Grafton:	1,837 hours, 9,421 miles
Mequon/Thiensville:	1,234 hours, 11,850 miles
Port Washington/Saukville:	1,601 hours, 14,415 miles

Volunteers also contributed 800 hours to providing respite care, enabling caregivers to leave their homes to keep appointments, attending social and religious events, and enjoying a break from care giving, assured that their loved one was safe with a caring volunteer in their absence.

133 new receivers contacted Interfaith Caregivers during 2005 to request assistance in addition to the current clients already being served.

63 new volunteers joined Interfaith Caregivers during 2005.

COMING IN MARCH

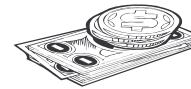
